REMEMBERING OUR LEADERS

The SE Michigan bridge community lost two prominent leaders in 2023: Grant Petersen and Posh Gulati. Both strong bridge players, Grant and Posh were also instrumental in creating the vibrant community centered around the Connection (BC) in Southfield. Grant, as an MBA Board member and co-owner of the BC and Posh. as SOMBA president, contributed to many collaborative efforts that ultimately set the stage for the recent Unit merger. Longtime MBA Board member Dick Temkin recalls:

In 2013 the BC was looking to move to a new location. Grant approached me with the idea of holding all of the local sectionals at a new, bigger site in Southfield that they would be able to afford with the guaranty of revenue from them. The only problem was that would need SOMBA's approval to hold our tournaments in its territory. Bridge De-"myth"-ified: Ironing Out the Learning Curve

(Beginner/Intermediate)

As advertised in the last TT issue, in 2020 an expert player posted an article on BridgeWinners.com titled: Most Pervasive "Bridge Club Myths" re Bidding? The article garnered hundreds of comments from players around the globe contributing obscure "bridge-isms" that their local players insist are true. In this new TT series, we'll begin breaking down some of these myths:

count with small doubleton from one without. Compare the following hands:

♦AQ **♥**KT87 **♦**KJ43 **♣**K92 | **♠**72 **♥**AKT

♠72 ♥AKT8 **♦**KJ43 **♣**KQ9

You'd be doing a disservice to your partner if you open one of these hands 1N but not the other. If we do not open 1N, partner needs to be able to assume we do not have a balanced 15-17 count, regardless of our specific honor location.

2. "The best bridge players use a lot of bidding conventions." → This is by no means true. Many 21st century world championships have been won by pairs with simple systems. Sure, some conventions can solve pesky bidding problems. But using a bid conventionally means we lose something else, so the convention has to be incredibly helpful to be worth it. For instance, using Stayman over 1N openings means that we can never play the contract of 2♣ after partner opens 1N. Stayman is certainly worth the loss, but that isn't always as clear.

The memory strain for remembering conventions is relevant, too, and can zap our mental energy. What good does it do us to go to the effort of using a fancy convention to get to the best contract if we're too tired to play it properly?

ARBITRATION STATION: RULING THE GAME

What happens if partner misses an alert in face-to-face bridge?

In the ACBL, when you make an alertable bid, you are not allowed to know if and how partner alerts and explains it. You must act as though partner alerted properly, even if you know they haven't.

If your side ends up declaring, you must inform your opponents that there was a missed or misexplained alert at the end of the auction. If your side is defending, you must do so at the end of the hand. The opponents may call the director at this time.

» How many spades does partner likely have?

The opponents are advertising a spade fit, implying eight total spades. Accounting for our three, partner likely has two.

» What are partner's two most likely shapes?

2=3=3=5 and 2=4=3=4

Partner has at most two spades, has at most four hearts, and shouldn't have 4+ diamonds after opening 1♣ (unless 4=5 or 4=6 in the minors).

» What action should you take? Bid 3♣.

At matchpoints, try to avoid letting the opponents play at the 2-level when neither side is vulnerable (unless you have good reason to think you're beating it). So, you definitely want to act here.

Bidding 3♣ gets us to our club fit if partner is 2=3=3=5; partner will correct to hearts with 2=4=3=4. Making a takeout double isn't unreasonable, but implies a stronger hand and/or shorter spades.

This problem was submitted by a panelist who encountered it in an expert team match. Most panelists passed, even at a vulnerability that favors bidding. Many were worried about a misfit with partner, and some mentioned that they'd have bid 14 over 14. On this deal, North's hand was:

♠AKJ6 **♥**K853 **♦**AT9 **♣**K2

In the match, both North players passed, but others may choose to double back in.

Bob Katz (P): Partner chose not to bid over 2♥. He may have 4 hearts together with some diamond length. They have at fewest 22 points, maybe more.

John Koschik (P): Partner may have as many as nine red cards. This could be an adverse double part-score deal, but that's no different than going for 300. I would bid 2♠ at MPs. DBL is dangerous because it might be left in.

Irv Rosenstein (P): Maybe we have a part-score in a black suit, Page 8

but likely a big misfit, with partner 4-5 in the red suits.

Dick Temkin (P): Not enough to bid and it's hard to imagine this is our hand when partner couldn't take a second call.

Mike Crane (3♣): if I bid 2♠ can't get to clubs; 3♣ allows me to get to spades over 3♥.

Debra Eaves (2♠): If they have a fit then we have a fit. I didn't make a negative double originally, so bidding 2♠ now shows five spades and very few points.

Owen Lien (2♠): Partner is marked with 18-19 balanced (or nearly so). I can bid 2♠, and this can't just be a lot of spades. I didn't make a weak jump shift on the first round, so I must have another place to play in case partner is 1=4=5=3 or 1=4=4=4.

Willie Winokur (X): Opener has Heart length and 17/18 points. Their Hearts are 5/3 (advancer did not jump raise/mixed raise). Points feel like 12/13 to 7/8. My original pass showed too weak to negative double or bid 1♠. So, a penalty pass is unlikely unless he is looking at 6 solid tricks. I think the final contract will be clubs unless opener is 4=4=3=2 with 18.

Editor's note: Kudos to Willie for correctly calling out North's hand!

This problem netted a near record

number of unique responses. Many raised clubs, but this ranged from a simple 34 raise to a 44 splinter. Others felt it was important to introduce the hearts. An advantage of jumping in clubs is that it can leave the opponents guessing. More descriptive bids, such as a splinter or showing hearts, may better help partner evaluate what to do if the auction progresses to a high level.

Mark Bendure (5♠): Could be a make or a good sacrifice. Now let the villains guess.

Marty Hirschman (5♣): Normal action.

Debra Eaves (3♠): Bidding 3♠ would be too weak for the strength of this hand and 3♥ doesn't show our fit in clubs [...] Choices are now 3♠ to show a strong raise of clubs or 4♠ to show a splinter. I hate to punish partner so I vote for 3♠ and leave the decision of bidding 5♠ to partner should they bid 4♠.

Jonathan Fleischmann (3♥):

A former partner of mine used to describe this as a fit-showing non-jump, characterized by the idea that such a bid by a passed hand could be justified only by some fit for partner's suit.

Christian Jolly (3♥): Over 3N, I plan to bid 4♠. At MPs you can't

afford to miss a heart fit.

Joe Chiesa (4*): Although 5* may be superior. Hoping partner will know what to do if they say 5*.

John Koschik (4♠): It's possible that it's right to bid 6♠ over 5♠, and this seems like the best way to tell partner about that.

Morrie Kleinplatz (4♥): I expect to be alone in bidding this, but I think it is bridge logic to have this be a fit jump rather than a splinter.

Linda Perlman (3♣): For now. I doubt auction will end here. Maybe I'll know better next time. Partner probably doesn't have 4♥.

The editor faced this divisive problem at a local club game. Many panelists passed, eyeing a likely misfit and slow, defensive values. Others balanced with a double, which implies this shape having already dened 4+♠ and 3+♥. Still others balanced into a red suit, hoping to either make or go -1, a small price if the opponents are making 90 or 110 in clubs.

Brenda Bryant (P): Partner is in third chair and doesn't have to have much, my RHO could have trap in hearts...

Joe Chiesa (P): I have 8 flat with no known fit opposite a third seat opener. Thinking about it is an overbid.

Jerry Grossman (P): No reason we can make anything, and they might go down. My guess is that the panelists will go for double.

Owen Lien (P): Partner didn't make a takeout X. Opps are vul against not, and I have a death holding in clubs (one where we might lose the first 3 tricks).

Willie Winokur (P): Plus 100 should be OK.

Kurt Dasher (X): Maximum and tolerance for all suits, and if partner can sit for penalty that will work.

Christian Jolly (X): Partner should expect almost exactly this hand. I don't play penalty doubles under the bidder, I can't have four spades, can't have three hearts.

Bob Katz (X): I wish I had a slightly better hand but I do have the right distribution.

Gene Benedict (2**♦):** Since I am not vulnerable, I can take a chance here.

Dick Temkin (2♦): -50 beats -90!

Bob Webber (2 \blacklozenge): I think W has done the right thing.

No set of panel problems is complete without a "freak" hand. Many made a practical bid of 5, which may make depending on the clubs, and forces the opponents to guess what to do at the 5-level. Others showed the club suit on the way to bidding more, and a couple of "heros" in the bunch chose 3N, hoping the &K was enough of a stopper.

Gene Benedict (5♦): This could be a double game swing. All partner needs is a doubleton club.

Brenda Bryant (5♦): May have slam, but I really want to play the hand not defend...so let them guess and make it look like I'm guessing.

Joe Chiesa (5♦): Probably playing 5♦ or defending 5♠. 4♣ culls the right lead when we defend but 5♦ better forestalls 5♠. 6♦ is too hard to find.

Jonathan Fleischmann (4♣): I'm hoping partner can cuebid a club singleton to justify bidding a diamond slam. If not, I'll settle for 5♦. Table Talk

Jerry Grossman (4♣): I will bid 5♦ next, and probably bid 6♦ over 5♠. If partner gets very excited after my game try, then I suppose I might bid 6♦ freely.

Mark Bendure (3N): This probably won't get a lot of votes, but it is one of those MP hands calling for a bad bid at a good time. I'm betting that LHO has the A of spades and won't lead it. [...] There is some risk and I will look like a fool if they run the first 5 or 6 spade tricks, but I think that the odds are on my side. Two tops and one bottom make for a great matchpoint score.

Marty Hirschman (3N): Can't resist going for the top here, which I will get pretty much whenever LHO has the ace of spades, as is likely. (Ready to congratulate them if he/she leads it.)

Morrie Kleinplatz (4♥): Again, I expect to be alone in this bid. My reason is tactical. Our most likely result is 5♦ making 5. If I bid 5♦ directly, or 4♣ along the way, their likely double fit will prompt them to sacrifice. I want to give them the wrong impression so that they will leave me there, or perhaps even double me.

John Koschik (6♠): First, it's just possible that slam is cold. Partner could have a singleton club or king-doubleton. Also, I have real concern over our ability to beat 5♠. The opening lead will be a diamond that gets ruffed (even a ruff-sluff is possible). Declarer will pull trump (or at least fell my king) and lead a heart. I'm back in with nothing good to lead.

A simple evaluation problem: Most panelists showed a simple raise here, but some viewed the had as a limit raise for spades.

Marty Hirschman (2♠): With just three trump, the void is only worth 2 or 3 points. Also, partner rates to be short in diamonds, so QJ will have limited value. No reason to stretch at matchpoints.

Christian Jolly (2♠): These hands always play worse than you think. Voids are infinitely more useful in a 9-card fit. Here they just lead trumps twice and partner's four heart losers blow up in our face.

John Koschik (2♠): I don't think my void justifies thinking I have a limit raise.

Bob Webber (2♠): Nice hand, but partner has lots of hearts to deal with. By the way, E has 4+ hearts. Why no negative double? Opener or partner has a good hand.

Mike Crane (2♣): Looks like a limit raise to me

Owen Lien (2♠): Hand is worth a limit raise so that's what I'll show. Page 11

INTERMEDIATE/ NEWCOMER NOOK

Bidding: Learning the Language

When learning a new game, one of the hardest parts can be learning its language. In card games, this may include knowing what each card is called (e.g. "king of spades"), what we call a set of cards played by each player in turn (a "trick"), or what it means to "ruff" with a "trump."

In bridge, the auction introduces a host of vocabulary that isn't too common in other card games. Bidding is complex and full of integrated rules and exceptions, but learning the language can help streamline some of these principles.

The following are examples of common confusions in bidding language, and how understanding them can simplify bidding overall:

"Game Forcing" vs. "Forcing"

A GAME FORCING bid tells partner they are not to stop bidding below the game level.

A FORCING bid tells partner they must bid again, but not that we're necessarily going to game. This is sometimes called "forcing for one round" or "F1."

WEST NORTH EAST SOUTH 1♥ P 1♠ P

3.

→ West's 3♣ bid is a **game forcing** jump shift. East has only promised about 6+ HCP by responding 1♠. Thus, West shows about 18+ to force to game here. Page 14

WEST NORTH EAST SOUTH

1♥ 1♠ 2♠

→ East's 2♠ cuebid is **forcing** but does not promise enough to force to game opposite a minimum opening. East is showing 3+ card support in hearts and at least an invitational hand. In this case, West opened at the 1-level, so East's minimum to invite is around 11 HCP.

WEST NORTH EAST SOUTH

2♠ P 3♦

→ Again, East's bid of 3♦ is **forcing** but does not promise enough to force to game opposite a minimum Weak 2. East is showing at least invitational values. In this case, over a Weak 2, East's minimum to invite is around 15 HCP.

Internalizing the distinction here can help solidify HCP ranges as opener and responder. Remember to bid assuming partner has a minimum for what they've shown. It is up to partner to tell you if they happen to have extras.

"Distribution points" "Shortness/length points"

Hand evaluation is one of the toughest parts of the game. This is an area where rules are meant to be broken, and it requires a keen eye to know when to do so.

High-card points (HCP) are limiting in how they translate to the strength of a given hand. Consider the following two 10-counts:

♦AKT953 **♥**K85 **♦**874 **♣**3 **♦**T953 **♥**K85 **♦**A87 **♣**K43

The first hand has a 6-card suit and **concentrated honors.** It is a better hand than the second, which is balanced with scattered honors. Yet, they still both add up to 10 HCP.

players Many learn to "distribution points" to overcome these HCP woes. A common method is to assign a point for each card beyond the 4th or 5th in a suit, or assign 3 points for a void, 2 for a singleton, and 1 for a doubleton.

There are two issues here: First, counting both length and shortness is double counting, because having a longer suit means you will also have a shorter one. Second, these methods overvalue shortness when we don't know yet if our shortness meshes well with partner's hand.

There are some useful principles in distribution points; for instance, having shortness generally helps hands play better, but not if the shortness is in partner's long, strong suit. Similarly, having a 5+ card suit can be good in NT as a source of tricks. However, this is less true if the suit is something like 86532.


To elevate your game, try to move beyond distribution points. Look for:

- » Honors clustered in long suits
- » Prime honors (A/K) vs. soft honors (Q/J)
- » Honors and T/9's that support each other vs. being scattered
- » A shape that can provide a **source** of tricks (e.g. ruffing partner's losers, or running in a NT contract

These are positive features that help you consider the whole context of a hand and whether you hold a "good" or "bad" 10-count, for instance.

A GRAND OLE TIME

AT THE MOTOR CITY REGIONAL

(Advanced)

The odds of a grand slam making on any given hand are under 3%. This narrows to ~1% for 7N specifically, which translates to a ~23% chance that 7N will make on at least one hand in a set of 26. In the Friday Open Pairs at the Motor City Regional, there were three making 7N contracts across two 26-board sessions. One of them was not a particularly "good" grand (i.e. it is just lucky that it makes), but the other two were both good contracts and reasonable to bid with solid agreements.

A good rule of thumb here is: Don't bid a grand unless you can count 13 tricks on the auction. See the following two hands from the Regional:

Difficulty: Int./Advanced **★** KQJ2 **▼** AJ4 **◆** Q3 **♣** K986

WEST 1N 4♥ 5♣ 7N EAST 4♦ 4N 5N

West opens 1N; East makes a Texas Transfer (6+ \blacktriangledown). East asks for keycards, then bids 5N to ask for kings, which also confirms that we have all five keycards and the \blacktriangledown Q. West can now count 13 tricks: $4 \blacktriangle 6 \blacktriangledown 1 \spadesuit 2 \clubsuit$. West bids 7N rather than $7 \blacktriangledown$ because it pays better and isn't subject to an unlucky ruff on opening lead.

Difficulty: Advanced

♦ AKJT54 **♥** K **♦** AJ73 WEST 1♠ 2♠ 4♣

EAST 2♦ 3N 4♠

Assume E/W play 2/1. East sets up a game force; West shows 6+ spades. Because jumping takes up precious space in 2/1 auctions, jumps should have very precise meanings. It is useful to play the jump to 3N here denies 2+ spades and

4N 5♣ 5♦ 6♣ 7♠

shows 15-17 HCP. West now shows their clubs, and East bids 4♠ having already denied 2+ in the suit. West asks for keycards and the trump Q with spades as trump, and learns that East has the following honors: ♠Q ♥A ♣K. West can count 11 tricks (6♠ 2♥ 1♦ 2♣) but this assumes only 9 HCP for East. The honors unaccounted for are the ♥QJ, ♦KQJ, ♣Q. If East has the ♦K (trick #12) s/he still needs 3+ more HCP which would have to include a queen for trick #13. West asks for the ♦K, East shows it by bidding 7♠, and West corrects to 7N.

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I/N Nook - Counting Practice (Answers)

- 1. We led a small heart at trick 1, and partner would ve played the ♥A if they had it. So, declarer has the ♥AQ and has also played the ♣AK for 13 total HCP. Partner switched to the ◆8 leading a high card in the middle of the hand implies nothing higher in the suit. So, declarer also has the ◆KJ for 17 total HCP. Partner must have the ♣AJ, so we should win the ◆A switch to the ♣Q to lead through dummy's ♣K.
- 2. E/W have 13 tricks available: 2♠ 9♥ 1♠ 1♣. We have 7 hearts in the East hand, plus two club ruffs with dummy's hearts (so long as we ruff the clubs before pulling trumps).
- 3. A diamond the opponents advertised a diamond fit on the auction. We have the other five, so partner is likely void and able to ruff a diamond lead.
