Steve Landen, Jeffrey Starr

Two former giants of Michigan bridge passed away this fall.

Steve Landen, 64, was a Grand Life Master with six national championships. Locally,

he won the Edward F. Stein Memorial Trophy, MBA's player-of-the-year award, in 1978, 1980, 1982 and 1988. He also won the William S. Mous-

er Memorial Trophy, for most points won by a District 12 member at the Motor City Regional, in 1980, 1988, 1989, 1991, 1992 and 2003. He was a former author of the It's Your Bid column in Table Talk.

Steve and his family moved to Maryland in the early 2000s, where his wife Lynne Schaefer, also a national bridge champion, was a facilities vice president at the Uni-

versity of Maryland-Baltimore County. A former computer programmer, he continued to pursue his career as a bridge professional until about a decade ago, when he began suffering the early stages of dementia. He died in late October of hypothermia after falling near his home in Ellicott MD.

Jeffrey Starr, 68, was a top Detroit-area player before moving to Las Vegas in the late 1980s to pursue gambling



and business interests. He won the Stein trophy in 1981 and the Mouser in 1969. He apparently only

played occasionally at nationals since leaving Michigan. Jeffrey was second overall three times in NABC+ (so-called "national") events, most recently the 2012 Truscott/USPC Senior Swiss. Jeffrey spent

some time in Michigan over the past two years and was planning to move back here. He died in December following a long battle with lung cancer.

I had the great pleasure of playing with both Steve and Jeffrey while they were living in Michigan. Both were tremendous natural card players, exciting personalities and good friends. —M.H.

Attendance drops at Motor City Regional

Attendance at the 2017 Motor City Regional was just 739.5 tables, down 105 tables from 2016. The tournament showed a profit of \$2,878, compared to a budgeted profit of \$7,600.

The biggest drops in attendance were on Sunday, and in the KOs.

The combined Swiss events on Sunday were down 26 tables (13 fewer teams x 2 ses-

sions).

The 2016 regional racked up a total of 60 tables in KO events. There was only sufficient attendance to run a single Flight B KO for 13 total tables in 2017.

They even let me sit North-South a few times until it became apparent that my heart and other body parts are just fine, thank you, and I wasn't going to die anytime soon. So, being "only" 68 years old (as of late December), I'm back to East-West. At least it all gave me a pretty good excuse for being a little late getting out this issue of Table Talk.

Congratulations to Jonathan Fleischmann for his perfect score on this issue's problems. Also, congratulations to Valentine Enache for best score among readers.

No matter your age or health you will always be South in It's Your Bid. So send in your answers to next issue's problems, found at the end of this article.

1. MTPTs. N-S vul. As SOUTH, you hold:

If there is room to bid both unbid suits below 3NT, you can just bid the one you have the stopper in. That's not the case here. It is a big headache. In my view, the focus

should be on spades, since that is what the opponents are going to lead most of the time. 3NT should show a spade stopper, 3\u03a4 deny a spade stopper.

Only one panelist seems to agree:

Howard Perlman (3♠): First obligation is to find the right game. 3♠ is sort of "last train" to 3NT. Would have bid 1NT over 1♥, though that doesn't necessarily solve all problems.

No one else seems very sure.

Suzy Burger (3♠): I hope partner takes it as asking.

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Irv Rosenstein (3♠): See if partner can bid 3NT.

Chuck Burger (4♣): Where I live. Can't bid 3♥ (Honor-x or better), and 3♠ a telling bid or otherwise ambiguous.

Sheldon Kirsch (4♣): I'll pass 4NT. Wish I could bid 3♣.

Marilyn Maddox (4♣): Without a spade stopper, let partner decide.

Willie Winokur (3♥): Deferring to pard how to proceed. Hope I like his next bid.

The majority just goes for the gusto...

Joe Chiesa (3NT): Clearly our most likely game. 3♠ shows spades, 3♥ as a waiting bid fails on three counts: 1) When I bid 3♥, the rules forbid me from saying "waiting bid." 2) I lack one heart. 3) 3♥ is a bigger bid than 4♥ – so the strength measure is errant.

Gene Benedict (3NT): Jeff Meckstroth did the same thing in a similar auction. Dummy had Qxx of spades. I had KJx. The jack of spades lead beats the hand. I didn't find it.

Bob Brent (3NT): Per Hamman's rule and Bert's law...

Brenda Bryant (3NT): Somebody has to bid it. Maybe they

won't lead a spade or they will be 4-4 or partner will bid 4♦.

Jonathan Fleischmann (3NT): This feels like an application of Hamman's Rule. Slam is remote on these cards, and sometimes partner has enough of a stopper with three little spades.

Bob Katz (3NT): The fact that neither NV opponent chose to bid spades is very favorable. Sometimes spades are 4-4, and 3NT is the only makeable game.

2NT would show about 19 HCPs with a balanced hand, while 2♦ would show about 17-18 with long diamonds. You are too good for either of those. We could cuebid 3♣ or jump to 3♦ to show 19+ HCPs, but we aren't likely to find out anything useful.

Jonathan Fleischmann (3NT): The problem with 3♣ or 3♦ is that neither gives partner a way to find out about my club stoppers. 2♦ gives partner space, but is too much of an underbid. It doesn't take much from partner for this to come home, and he may not know if he has the right yarborough.

To put it another way, if merely insubstantial-looking values in partner's hand will give you enough to make a contract, you have to bid it yourself.

Howard Perlman (3NT): Too much to do anything else.

Bob Webber (3NT): Partner rates to have a few diamonds.

Dennis Kasle (3NT): Best chance for game. With nobody bidding spades, my partner surely has a card. 3♦ is probably the better bid, but partner would not know what to do after that.

Sheldon Kirsch (3NT): Don't need much, and should get a club lead.

Morrie Kleinplatz (3NT): A 3-4-3-3 yarborough from partner might be enough. The red queens would make it a high percentage game, and many other holdings work.

Bob Katz (2NT): It is right on

values and I have a source of tricks. Likelihood of a slam is minimal. If I bid anything else, I will likely have to bid 3NT later. I would bid 3NT if I was assured a club lead, but sometimes the opponents don't cooperate, either because they are void or because they have something else to lead.

Bob Brent (3NT): Hope lefty has a club to lead.

John Koschik (2NT): If partner bids 3♥, I may wish I had bid diamonds, but 2NT is about right on clubs and overall strength.

Don Rumelhart (2NT): This shows a good hand. I'll see if partner can squeeze out a raise.

Gene Benedict (2NT): Invites game and shows a big hand. I will probably take one spade, five diamonds and two club tricks in 2NT.

Chuck Burger (3♦): 2NT has a matchpoint charm. 2♦=good hand. 3♦ begs for a bid. If I catch a bid, I will try NT.

Joe Chiesa (3♦): Although 3NT seems patently obvious with a double stopper and a 20-count including a good 6-card suit, 6♦ opposite ♠Kxx ♥xxxxx ♦xxxx ♣x offers a

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reasonable play for slam. Moreover, I may yet offer 3NT over 3♥ or 3♠.

Partner was under pressure and may have stretched to raise because he had four spades, but, with our good controls and decent trump, we still are worth a slam try or two.

Don Rumelhart (4♣): Slam is likely, so I will continue the conversation with my cheapest cuebid.

Willie Winokur (4♣): And then 5♦.

Bob Webber (4♦): Then 5♣ to see if partner has a diamond control.

Brenda Bryant (5♠): I think this would imply I have minors covered. We may or may not have a slam here. Assuming opener has four spades.

Chuck Burger (4♣): Looking for a diamond cuebid. I will still try again. Six probably likely but suits not breaking. Pard has a good hand with four trump.

Looking, but with trepidation...

Howard Perlman (4♣): Must make some sort of try. Will bid 4♠ over either red suit cue by partner. Caution is paramount as bad splits may abound.

Irv Rosenstein (4♣): I will see if partner has slam interest. If he has no diamond control, we will stop in 4♠.

Kurt Dasher (4♣): Trying for slam. Will cuebid diamond ace next if partner cooperates.

Not looking...

Bob Katz (4♠): There is nothing about my hand that leads me to believe we have a slam.

Morrie Kleinplatz (4♠): This hand is not as good as it looks with a heart void and the minors behind me. Moreover, I play that partner could have bid 3♠ to show a strong spade raise, so she is just competing.

Linda Perlman (4♠): Partner could have bid 3♠ with a good spade raise. I have a good enough hand to try for slam,

but I'm going with things splitting badly and taking the low road.

Gene Benedict (4♠): I have many negative features on this hand. I lack good spade spots, my heart void means I can't set up dummy's hearts. West's diamonds are over my diamonds. The spades are unlikely to break 2-2. There is too much work to do.

Bob Brent (4♠): Things are going to break poorly, and it may be difficult to make 12 tricks. My first inclination was to bid a slam, but common sense prevailed.

Going all the way!

Dick Temkin (6♠): Would expect 16-18 points without the interference, but now partner may be stretching with 4-5 in the majors and a good opener. 5NT (Grand Slam Force) is tempting, but heart wastage is likely and could easily have a minor suit loser.

Maybe going beyond all the way.

Dennis Kasle (4♣): Looking for 4♦, then 4NT. Don't care if I am void. I need two with the queen for thoughts of 7.

Wow.

PAGE 10 TABLE TALK club suit, with stoppers and too much to bid just 3. It doesn't really promise a solid suit. Our club void is a big minus, to say the least, but we still have an awful lot to just pass.

Morrie Kleinplatz (Pass): I don't expect to have much company, but this seems like a crapshoot to me. We may make anything from 4 to 7. What would you bid with ♣A ♥x ◆QJx ♣AKQJxxxx? If there was a way to ask for first- or second-round diamond control I would go on.

The 5♥ bidders think they have the answer to that.

Dick Temkin (5♥): Partner has to have more than a solid club suit and a diamond stopper. Just want to be sure he has the ace or king. Would be pusillanimous to do less!

Gene Benedict (5♥): This bid focuses on the diamond problem for slam. 6♣ by my partner would show solid clubs and the Kx of diamonds.

Chuck Burger (5♥): Focus on second-round control of diamonds. Over 5NT I will try 6NT and expect ace of spades.

I'm confused. Might not partner have something like

QJx of diamonds to bid 5NT over 5 ?

Bob Brent (5NT): Protecting partner's diamond K. He should bid 6 with second-round diamond control.

Bob Webber (4♣): After 4♦, 6NT. After 4♠, maybe 5NT.

Sheldon Kirsch (4NT): Got six tricks and spade help. Should make a move.

Dennis Kasle (4NT): Can't be quantitative because partner is bidding on long clubs and a diamond stopper or two.

Bob Katz (4•): This has to show solid hearts and serious slam interest without a diamond control. Partner likely has long clubs he believes will run, a diamond stopper and maybe the spade queen.

Just shooting it out:

John Koschik (6NT): It would help to know partner' style, but if he has solid clubs, he only needs the diamond ace or spade ace and diamond king.

Irv Rosenstein (6NT): Should have plenty of tricks if they cannot cash two winners before we get in. Something like ♠Ax ♥x ♠Kxx ♣AKQJxxx or ♠Qx ♥x ♠Axx ♣AKQJxxx.

If partner has that much, we don't need to bid the slam ourself. Partner will surely bid the slam over any invitation.

may evoke useful info from the omnicompetent seated opposite me.

Dennis Kasle (Dbl): Then we'll see.

Chuck Burger (Dbl): Followed by 3NT over diamonds and 4♥ over 3♣. A direct 3NT or 4♥ is unnecessary.

But if we double and partner bids 2NT Lebensohl (weak relay) won't we have wrongsided 3NT (and 4♥)?

Bob Katz (3NT): I cannot double without likely wrongsiding a 3NT contract (Lebensohl response). 3NT is one trick fewer than 4♥.

Howard Perlman (3NT): Strong possibility only nine tricks available. Need much less from partner than in 4Ψ .

Jonathan Fleischmann (3NT): I'm not sure what's right here, but I know I've found a making contract if they lead their suit. 4♥ requires more than that to make, and both contracts may be fine if partner actually has something. I'm certainly not giving the opponents any help on defense.

Don Rumelhart (3NT): I am hoping for a black suit lead or some of partner's points in diamonds.

Linda Perlman (3NT): I have

8-plus tricks in NT and I am balanced. These hands never make 4♥.

Other ideas:

Sheldon Kirsch (4♥): If I bid 3NT, I may get the surprise diamond lead.

Morrie Kleinplatz (4♥): This is a strong bid in the passout seat. Partner should go on with two aces and a little more. Double is good, too, but I'd hate to hear partner bid hearts and get the lead from the wrong side.

John Koschik (Dbl): This will wrong-side notrump if partner has trash (Lebensohl) but will keep slam in the picture on other hands.

Answering that:

Bob Webber (3NT): Every card we need for slam could be in East's hand.

Slam seems like a very long shot. Just making a game sounds good to me.

Sheldon Kirsch is the 2017 winner of the Edward F. Stein Memorial Trophy, MBA's player-of-the-year award.

The Stein, first awarded in 1961, is inscribed annually with the name of the MBA member who wins the most total masterpoints in overall placings in unlimited championship events at the unit's sectional and regional tourincluding naments, joint MBA-SOMBA sectional. Points won at the Motor City Regional are counted at 70 percent, compared to 100 percent for points won at the sectionals.

Kirsch amassed 154.42 Stein points during the year, the 4th highest winning total in the trophy race. He previously won the Stein in 2015.

Top Bridge Pros' Tax Woes Continue

Recently, the #1 and #2 WBF-ranked players Geir Helgemo and Tor Helness were convicted of gross negligent tax fraud by the Oslo District Court. Born in Norway, they began to represent Monaco in international competition almost a decade ago.

They were accused of not paying Norwegian taxes on combined earnings of 18,000,000 NOK (around \$2.3 million) over an 8-year period. The court deemed this to be in violation of Norwegian tax law and sentenced Helgemo to 14 months in prison plus a fine of 280,000 NOK (around \$38,000), while Helness was sentenced to 16 months in prison and fined 340,000 NOK (around \$43,000).

We spoke with Helgemo, and learned that he is going to appeal this decision. He believes he has a good chance of a much lighter sentence because he feels that he was under the tax laws of Monaco (which has no individual income tax), as the earnings in question were "paid in Monaco to play for Monaco, and (we) are also residents of

Monaco. However, we are still not convinced about the tax rules and can certainly not understand them." Even if the sentence isn't reduced on appeal, the expected amount of prison time would be 6-11 months.

Opening lead: 9 of spades

At a recent club game I played 3NT on this seemingly dull layout. I have an easy 10 tricks by knocking out the heart ace. Meanwhile, the defense will set up their spades. After that it will be risky at best to duck a club trying to set up a long card in that suit since there will be the chance of losing the lead to East, who would have one or more spades to cash.

The problem, if it can even be called that, seemed to revolve around losing the lead twice. So after winning the spade lead (ducking cannot help) I decided to go to dummy with a diamond and lead the 9 of hearts through East, who was likely to have the ace for his overcall.

East could hardly take the heart ace at that point because that would give me an extra trick if I had Qxx of hearts. So, the queen of hearts won the trick.

Next I cashed the rest of the diamonds. East, who started with just a singleton diamond, pitched two clubs and two hearts. Since his failure to make a Michaels cuebid precluded him from having started with five hearts, I knew he was down to blank ace, so I could safely duck a club. Clubs were 3-3 originally, so I wound up with 11 tricks and a tie for top on the board.

East actually started with ♠QJ1065 ♥A764 ♦4 ♣953. To hold me to 10 tricks, he had to hold onto a small heart along with his ace. Then the opponents could run hearts when in with the club.

If East had started with four clubs, he really would have been in trouble on the run of the diamonds since he would have had to hold onto guards in spades, hearts and clubs.

Zhangs, Winokur trade trophies

In 2016, Henry Zhang and Yanping Zhang tied for first for the Beverly Bluth Trophy, MBA's Flight B player-of-theyear award, while Steven Winokur won the Flight C Willie Winokur Trophy. But for 2017, Winokur won the Bluth, while the Zhangs (who are not related but played as partners throughout both years) tied for first in the Winokur race.

How could this be?

Prior to 2017, the Bluth went to the MBA member who started the year with fewer than 2,000 points and won the most points in MBA tournaments. If that player started the year with fewer than 750 points, the cutoff for Flight C, the next-highest ranking C player was awarded the Winokur. Under that rule, the Zhangs won the Bluth even though they started 2016 with just a little over 100 points and Winokur each, was awarded the Winokur trophy (named for his father) as the next highest scoring Flight C player.

Starting in 2017, however, the MBA board decided that only players with between 750

and 2,000 points would to eligible to win the Bluth. That was Steven Winokur, who by the beginning of the 2017 had 875 masterpoints. Meanwhile the Zhangs each had just 292 points at the beginning of 2017, so they were still eligible to win the Winokur, which they did.
